#### The program has been benchmarked with Taif University

- Modern teaching methods, faculty training, and administrative processes have improved students' learning experiences, which was reflected in their ratings. The college/departments actively encourage student and faculty participation in teaching and learning surveys. The department head discussed survey results with students and course coordinators in separate forums.
- Course coordinators and department chairs discuss course strengths and weaknesses. Course reports include action plans to improve weaknesses and strengths.
- Students rated most physical therapy courses as satisfactory and responded well.
- The academic advising and counseling unit strives to help students succeed in school.
- Both male and female teaching staff are highly satisfied with their jobs, and the attrition rate was not linked to faculty dissatisfaction or work-life conflicts.
- Increased publication rate in the Department of Physical Therapy and Health Rehabilitation.
- Over time, more teaching staff publish refereed articles.
